Safe Respectful Learners



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Did you know that kindness was once a Knightly Virtue? Knightly virtues were part of every mediaeval Knight's code of honour and were standards that Knights tried to adhere to in their daily living and interactions with other people. Thanks to the Kindness Movement, kindness has not been left behind in the Middle Ages. The Kindness Movement tells us that, "Participating in regular small acts of kindness is beneficial to your health, longevity and well-being; making the decision to be a little kinder will bring more pleasure and direction to your life than ever before." What's more, "The practice of being kinder is a simple way to make your life more joyful and fulfilling. So, relax, enjoy, be friendly, laugh, be playful, help others. Focus on the things you enjoy rather on the things that annoy."

What good advice all that is! Does your family or your school need a "Kindness Movement" of its own making? A kind person is one who is described as being friendly, generous, warm-hearted, sympathetic, considerate, gentle, affectionate, forgiving. Could your home or school do with more people like this? Well, whether kindness blossoms or lies dormant depends on whether it is nurtured. Parents and teachers have the power to instill kindness in children by being supportive and affirming. If children learn to understand how others think and feel, they will better understand how their choices affect other people.

If we act in a kindly manner and do things in the same way we expect our children to act and do, then, our children will have a much better chance to be kind people. Here's a little story: "As the bus slowed down at the crowded bus stop, the bus conductor leaned from the platform and called out, 'Six only!' The bus stopped. The conductor counted on



six passengers, rang the bell, and then, as the bus moved off, called to those left behind, 'Sorry, plenty of room in my heart but the bus is full.' The conductor left behind a row of smiling faces. It's not what you do, it's the way you do it." The Friendship Book of Francis Gay.

If we teach our children about love and kindness by teaching them with love and kindness, they experience the good feelings that come with being helped. From this, they understand for themselves the value of helping, because they know that when they share kindness, they are making others feel good. Furthermore, they will be better able to understand that, when someone does something hurtful to them, they should try to handle it in a way that supports forgiveness not revenge, to make peace not war.

In our current society, there is the need to teach our children what "attractive" really means. The new trend of "Lookism" tends to present social acceptability as based upon how a person looks. But being "attractive" encompasses many traits such as kindness, friendliness, thoughtfulness, being interesting, being a healthy eater and having an individual and natural body image. Who you are on the inside is much more important than what you look like on the outside. The poet, Adam Lindsay Gordon, left behind these famous lines: "Life is mostly froth and bubble Two things stand alone, □Kindness in another's trouble Courage in your own." Ye Wearie Wayfarer.

God, our Father, we ask You to establish a kinder, gentler order in our lives and in the lives of our children. Gently grow this kindness within us, so that it may be expressed to others through the sympathetic influence of what we say and do. May we be safe respectful learners. Amen.

Easter Sunday: The Resurrection

On Easter Sunday, Christians celebrate the resurrection of the Lord, Jesus Christ. It is typically the most well attended Sunday service of the year for Christian churches.

Christians believe, according to Scripture, that Jesus came back to life, or was raised from the dead, three days after his death on the cross. As part of the Easter season, the death of Jesus Christ by crucifixion is commemorated on Good Friday. Through his death, burial, and resurrection, Jesus paid the penalty for sin, thus purchasing for all who believe in him, eternal life in Christ Jesus.

The Season of Easter

The celebration of the Easter Vigil is the beginning of the season of Easter. While the Vigil marks the end of the celebration of Holy Week, and the end of repentance and conversion for which Lent prepared the community, it is much more a beginning. It is the beginning of a new season of grace and a time of joy and thanksgiving, for Easter is not one day or one solemnity—it is a fifty day celebration from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday.

The colour of the Season of Easter is white reflecting new life, fulfilment, rejoicing and joy. I offer you the following Easter reflection:



The apostles' acts continue the work of Jesus, through the ways they bring his liberating message and his healing. And Jesus is very much with us during the Easter Season, offering us his peace.

We ask to be able to share our faith and our love with others.

Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy: 8th December 2105 - 20th November 2016

Divine Mercy Sunday – Sunday 3rd April

Sunday 3rd April is the first Sunday after Easter but it is also known as Divine Mercy Sunday. On the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at the Mass for the canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John

Paul II proclaimed to the world that "from now on throughout

the Church this Sunday will be called Divine Mercy Sunday."

On the Second Sunday of Easter, the responsorial psalm and Gospel for Cycles A, B and C centre on the theme of mercy. In Psalm 118 we sing three times, "His mercy endures forever." The Gospel, from John 20:19-31, begins with the risen Christ appearing to the apostles on Easter night. Jesus calms his disciples by saying and giving them "Peace." He shows them the scars of his Passion, his wounded hands and side. His glorified body retains the evidence of his saving work through his suffering, death and resurrection.

He fills them with joy and again says to them—and produces in them—"Peace." Then he breathes on them and explains what the divine breathing means with the words, "Receive the holy Spirit.

Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." He gives the apostles the power of God's mercy for the sinner, the gift of forgiving sins from God's treasury of mercy. The other texts speak of healing and give the assurance there is nothing to fear.

For centuries in liturgy the Church has proclaimed the mercy of God through the Word of God and the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ. The liturgy is full with the promises of Divine Mercy and its grand effect in the lives of millions. By Rev. Alfred McBride, O.Praem.
