Inspired by Bishop Vincent

Last Wednesday 18 August Bishop Vincent Long OMF, Conv, Parramatta Diocese delivered the 2016 Ann Clark lecture at Evan Theatre, Penrith Panthers, titled, "Pope Francis and the challenge of being church today."

I was so inspired by his presentation that I would like to share parts of his lecture:

This was what Mary MacKillop did when she rallied her sisters behind the poor and vulnerable in colonial Australia. She took a prophetic stance, not simply in providing affordable quality Catholic education and health care to the poor masses, but fundamentally in meeting the great cultural challenges of their times. "Never see a need without doing something about it". In acting out of a strong passion for the Kingdom and a visceral compassion for the suffering, she brought about a fresh hope for others.....



Pope Francis constantly calls us to move beyond the security of the status quo and take the risk of going to the periphery. The church must be the church of the poor and for the poor. The church must go out of itself in order to be close to those in need. Conversely, the church that does not go out into the world keeps Jesus imprisoned......

Pope Francis has unleashed a new energy, he has poured a new wine which cannot be contained in old wineskins. He has challenged us to move in concert with him and bring about the rebirth of the church. I am endeavouring to follow the pope's lead. I have forfeited my Qantas Club membership, which is not a big deal these days. I fly with Tiger regularly — on a wing and a prayer. But that's the easy part. The harder part is to do what most of you do, which is to labour at the coalface of the church. It is have the smell of the sheep, to walk with people, identifying with them in their struggles, their questions and their uncertainties. It is to discern and live out the vision of hope in the midst of life's disappointments.

SMMK 2016 NAPLAN RESULTS

Last week children in year 3 and 5 from our school took home their 2016 Naplan Results. Back in May all students in year 3, year 5, year 7 and year 9 participated in the National Assessment Program-Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN).

The purpose of this assessment is to provide information to parents and teachers about the achievements of students in aspects of literacy and Numeracy. The test provides a measure of the students performance against establishes standards and against other students in our state. Each year the results are analysed by our school to inform our teaching with the intention of improving student performance.

The Commonwealth Government sets minimum acceptable standards for literacy, numeracy, reading, writing, grammar, punctuation and spelling at each year group assessed. These are referred to as minimum standards. Students performance in Naplan at our school are compared to these standards in the tables below

The percentages of students achieving at or above these national minimum standards are higher at St Mary MacKillop than the state percentage in all assessment areas in both year three and year five. Also the percentages of students in the top three bands in all assessment areas are higher at St Mary MacKillop than the state percentages in year three and year five.

Children need to play outside

We can't expect children to sit for hours on end, interspersed with little movement breaks and not expect consequences to their development. Some experts believe children need at least three hours of outdoor play on a daily basis in order to foster healthy sensory and motor development. They need opportunities to climb trees, run as fast as they can, use their imagination, test their strength, roll, climb, balance and even spin in circles. All of these activities use their brain, activate their muscles both big and small and engage the senses.

This lays the foundation for being able to pay attention, listen and learn in a classroom setting. So the next time you pick your children up from school, take them to a park and let them run around for a while. On the weekends spend the day at the beach, even if it's not sunny and warm — there are benefits in being outside in all kinds of weather. Encourage them to ride their bikes to friends' houses. Get to know your neighbours and create a community that watches out for the children so that they can play outdoors.

Studies indicate that when children switch from spending hours primarily indoors and sitting at a desk to one where the child is free to move and play throughout the day, the results can be far-reaching. Problems of poor attention all but disappear and children become attentive and active learners. Time spent playing outdoors fosters a joy of learning and confidence in one's abilities — two critical elements in the classroom and in life. All it takes is some time and a place to play outside.

As a society we're making great strides toward obesity prevention. While we are working to keep our children at healthy weights, we must also strive to ensure healthy behaviours, attitudes, sensory function, strength and coordination. The Spiritual Works of Mercy

Last KIT the Spiritual Works of Mercy were introduced. This week I would like to unpack the first 2 of these works and their implications for our lives today.

The seven Spiritual Works of Mercy are:

- 1. To instruct the uninformed;
- 2. To counsel the doubtful;
- 3. To admonish sinners;
- 4. To bear wrongs patiently;
- 5. To forgive offences willingly;
- 6. To comfort the afflicted;
- 7. To pray for the living and the dead.

Instruct the uninformed

This means, first of all, accepting our God-given responsibility to be the primary source of religious education and formation for our children. While Catholic schools help with this, the responsibility primarily rests with parents. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* states that "parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children" (2223). This includes, from an early age, reading to children Bible stories, the stories of the lives of the saints and praying together as a family.

Beyond our homes, of course, the need for instruction in the faith is equally urgent. Often there is no more effective (and no less threatening) way to share the Catholic faith with our friends than to do so *in the natural course of friendship itself*. Always be open to talking with others about your beliefs. There is always something more to discover about your faith.

Counsel the doubtful

Everyone has moments of doubt in their faith journey. Nevertheless, we should always remember that Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life and turn to him along our way.

The Sacrament of Confirmation

As many of our students are about to begin preparing to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation on Tuesday 13th September it is an opportune time to reflect on our understanding of this sacrament.

The sacrament of Confirmation builds on the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion and completes the process of initiation into the Catholic community. It establishes young adults as full members of the faith. This sacrament is called *Confirmation* because the faith given in Baptism is now confirmed and made strong. During Baptism, parents and godparents make promises to believe in God and the Church on a child's behalf. At Confirmation, the candidates renew those same promises, this time speaking for themself.

During Confirmation, the focus is on the Holy Spirit, who confirmed the apostles at Pentecost and gave them courage to practice their faith. Catholics believe that the same Holy Spirit confirms during the Sacrament of Confirmation and gives them the same gifts. The seven *gifts* of the Holy Spirit are: wisdom, understanding, right judgment, courage, knowledge, reverence and awe.

A bishop celebrates the Sacrament of Confirmation, because each bishop is a successor to the Apostles, upon whom the Holy Spirit descended at Pentecost—the first Confirmation. The bishop wears red vestments to symbolize the red tongues of fire seen hovering over the heads of the apostles at Pentecost.

Confirmation is administered by the laying on of hands, which signifies the descent of the Holy Spirit, and the anointing of the confirmation candidate with chrism (an aromatic oil that has been consecrated by a bishop). At the time of anointing the bishop will say "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit" This seal is a consecration, representing the safekeeping by the Holy Spirit of the graces bestowed on the Christian at Baptism.

All baptized persons can and should be confirmed. The effect of the Sacrament of Confirmation is to give strength in faith and for the practice of faith.

As a faith community we are encouraged to pray for our Confirmation candidates as they begin to prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation on Tuesday 13th September.

Mary MacKillop International Missions Fund-Used Postage Stamp Collection

Do you have used postage stamps that you can donate to fight poverty? Your used stamps can be recycled to help the poor. This activity will run for the whole term and is very simple. Just cut the stamps off the envelopes, leaving a generous margin and bring them into school. Each class has a plastic sleeve to place the collected stamps in.



Your used stamps, that you would generally throw out, can be recycled to help the poor in outback Australia and in countries like East Timor and Peru.

During 2015 \$34,500 was raised and since this initiative began in 2001 \$125,000 has been raised to help the Sister's of Mary MacKillop International.

A report based on students' completion of these assessments will be forwarded to parents during Term 4.


Scenery and Props Working Bee


