The Season of Advent

The Season of Advent, which begins this Sunday 3rd December, is a period of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. Advent marks the beginning of the Church year and the liturgical readings change at the start of Advent from Year A to Year B as part of the church's three year cycle.

As the Season of Advent approaches, it is helpful to re-familarise ourselves with some of the important aspects of this time of waiting. The word *Advent* means "coming" or "arrival." The focus of the entire season is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ in his First Advent, and the anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his Second Advent. The Season of Advent begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day and ends on Christmas Eve. The colour of this season is purple. This is the colour of penitence as well as the colour of royalty to welcome the Advent of the King. The purple of Advent is also the colour of suffering used during Lent and Holy Week. This points to an important connection between Jesus' birth and death. The purpose of Jesus' coming into the world and dwelling among us, is to reveal God and His grace to the world through Jesus' life and teaching, but also through his suffering, death and resurrection.

As the calendar year draws to a close, family schedules and personal agendas fill with meetings, programs, parties and annual obligations. Yet this busiest time of year calls us to draw close to others, above all to God, who became flesh and lived with us. During Advent our challenge becomes – how do we find moments of quiet when we open ourselves to God's presence in our lives? I offer you the following prayer that might start your quiet time with God.

God of Love, Your son, Jesus, is your greatest gift to us. He is a sign of your love. Help us walk in that love during the weeks of Advent, As we wait and prepare for his coming. We pray in the name of Jesus, our Saviour. Amen.

Year 6 Excursion - Canberra

Our Year 6 students recently visited an education tour of the national capital. Students were given the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the nation's capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$20 per student under the Parliament and Civics education rebate program towards those costs. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.







Year 6 Canberra Excursion by Jorja 6M

On Thursday the 16th of November, Year 6 set off on their overnight camp to Canberra. Year 6 met up on the playground at 6:45 am to board the double-decker bus at 7am. On the bus I sat up the top and it was loads of fun. I don't think anyone slept on the way. On the bus we sang loads of songs and it was very exciting. When we reached Goulburn we stopped at a park and had a snack. There was a huge playground and we didn't want to start driving again. After our 30 minute stop, we boarded the bus to reach our destination. Not long after, we finally crossed the border and everyone cheered.

Our first stop in Canberra was at Parliament House. During class we had learnt heaps about Parliament and it was great to actually be there. During our tour we did a role play of what happens in The House of Reps. I was lucky enough to be chosen to play the Prime Minister. The bill was 'Should farmers put aside 5% of their land for native flora and fauna?' Of course the Government won winning over one of the cross benchers. After our role play we went to visit the chambers. We were super lucky and were able to visit The Senate while they were sitting. On our way to The House of Reps, we learnt some new fun facts. These included information about the seventeen courtyards, the boomerang arms, and the fountain. In the Reps there was a lot of green and we were told where Emma Husar sat.

At approx. 2:30pm we got back on the bus to drive to the Australian War Memorial.When we arrived we watched an educational video about the previous wars. We started our tour in an exhibition called 'We will remember them'. During this exhibit we learnt a lot about true stories of soldiers in the army. Then we visited the 'Discovery zone' where we learnt what it was like to be in the army. In the discovery zone we went in a helicopter and there was a box that smelt like a crowded submarine. INSTANT REGRET! You could also see the horrid sight of trench foot and walk around in a submarine. The discovery zone was great but the best part was still to come. Next our tour guide took us to the Roll Of Honour. In the Roll of Honour you could find 102,000 names of soldiers who never made it back home. It was extremely emotional, especially when I found a family relative, John Maslin. Next we visited the grave of the unknown soldier and I had the privilege of reading the ode.



Not long after, we boarded the bus again to drive to our hotel. I was ecstatic when I found out that I was in a cabin with all of my friends. When we got back to our room we had 25 minutes to get dressed and ready for dinner. Once our time was up the teachers knocked on our doors and we all lined up outside. We went into the function room and had dinner. To be honest, it wasn't the best food and it wasn't fair because the teachers got a proper meal. It didn't really matter though because I was too excited to eat. Once we finished dinner we had another 15 minutes back in our room, then we all boarded the bus again to travel to the Australian Institute Of Sport.

When we arrived at the AIS we split up into our classes and were each given a tour guide. Our tour guide, Riley, took us to the arena first. The arena was the first building ever built in the whole institute. Then he took us to some training facilities. They included a gymnasium, a volleyball room, a body conditioning room and a swimming pool which was the warmest room out of all of them. Then we walked back to one of the best places on the whole trip, the sport room. In the sport room there were heaps of simulators and games. There was a paralympian simulator, a skeleton rush simulator, a chin up game, a basketball court, a bike simulator, podiums and much more.

On the bus ride home it was so much fun, which is code for it was extremely noisy. We left the AIS at 9pm so we didn't get back to our hotel until 9:20 pm. The first time I tried to find our room I was completely lost but eventually I found my way. We stayed up until midnight eating lollies and chatting. Because we had to get up at 6:30 in the morning I wanted to go to bed at a half reasonable time. All the others girls wanted to stay up talking except for Grace and I, so we moved out into the other room and fell asleep.

Because I was so excited I woke up at 5:45am. No one else was awake so I quickly got ready. Slowly everyone woke up except for Livie. I had a great idea! We all quickly dressed and tried to wake Livie. When she woke up we told her we had 5 minutes until we needed to go to breakfast. She was extremely stressed but when we told her- we all had a great laugh. Because we were all ready by 6:20am we still had 40 mins until brekkie. What else would we do except play hide and seek. I hid in the shower and had to stand on the edge. I nearly fell off when I heard Mr Carroll come into our room. Sienna didn't realise so she just stayed curled up in the cupboard. Finally it was time for breakfast and we lined up outside of the function room. After breakfast we set off for our next destination.

We all drove to the Old Parliament House where we had lots of fun. First up we watched a video on how our country came to be a democracy. Then we headed in to the D-Zone. In the D-Zone there were loads of interactive activities on how to vote and what the requirements are. Then we went into another room where we were going to have our own go at voting.

The options for the best fruit were peach, apple, banana and orange. I would tell you what I voted for but we learnt that votes are a secret ballot. Because the other class had to have a go too we got to play in the nearby rose gardens. The gardens were filled with thousands of types of flowers. It was STUNNING! Once the other class had finished we climbed back on the bus.





Our next stop was what I was most looking forward to. QUESTACON! There were 200 interactive exhibits and they showed that science could be fun. First, we went up the huge ramp passing all of the exciting rooms. Fortunately, we didn't do a tour so we could do our own thing. One of the scientists working there showed us some cool optical illusions and we also got to go inside an earthquake simulator. In another room a volunteer made an electric circuit out of our class. When the electricity came past it gave me a real shock. My favourite part of Questacon was in the last room. The 9m high freefall slide. It was such a shame when my friends didn't go on it but I ripped it off like a bandaid and went straight down. I was more nervous in the line then on the actual slide.

After Questacon it was time for all of my classmates to return home. I was lucky because I got to stay an extra two days for a dance competition in Canberra. I said goodbye to my friends and the bus slowly rolled out of the driveway. Canberra was by far the best excursion in primary school and I wish I could go back every day of the week!

But before we went in we were checked for cameras and got them taken off us. After we checked out the Senate they took us to the House of Representatives when we had a closer look at where our members of parliament sit. It was a really great experience going to Parliament House because we got to experience what it was like sitting in the House of Representatives we got to see the Senate sitting and participated in a role play of what happens in the House of Representatives.

When we finished at Parliament House we went to the Australian War Memorial . At the War Memorial we visited the roll of Honour and we got to see the Eternal Flame. I found the Eternal Flame really cool because it was raining and the flame didn't go out. We then visited the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The Unknown Soldier was a soldier that they brought back from Gallipoli who wasn't wearing his dog tags so they couldn't identify him. After we visited the tomb of the Unknown Soldier we went to the Discovery Zone where we could put our foot in a hole and a hologram was projected onto your foot making it look like you had the terrible disease... TRENCH FOOT. We could also experience being in a real Iroquois helicopter! The War Memorial was such a great experience because we also went into a very noisy room (a submarine) where there was a periscope and a smelly draw that smelt like old frozen yogurt gone bad! Once we had jumped on the bus the bus driver took us straight to Old Parliament House where we learnt about parliament and how an election works. In our election we had to vote for either apple banana orange or peach. After that we saw a video of how Democracy was made it was really cool because there were little holograms that flipped up to act out the people who were speaking. Then while we waited for 6K we had some activity time in the rose gardens outside parliament house The roses were absolutely magnificent and smelled even better. Our next stop was Questacon .

When we arrived at Questacon we had lunch. We were given a sandwich, a piece of fruit, a packet of chips and a drink. Once we had all finished our lunch we went into Questacon. We had to walk all the way to the top because we had to start at room number one. After the first room, we raced into the second room which had a lightning simulator every 14 minutes which was electrifying and also an earthquake simulator where you went into a little room and built a tower which you hoped would withstand the shock of the earthquake. If your towel fell over you lost.

The other thing that was very interesting about Questacon was the 6 metre high free fall slide. Almost everyone in my class did it! You had to climb the stairs to the slide but when you got to the top you couldn't see the curve at the bottom so I chickened out but watching everyone else do the slide was scary. There was also a room where you got a paper cup and cut strips in the edges to make flaps and then you put the cups on a fan and they propelled up into the air.

One form is to be completed per child, per individual sport and when completed, click SUBMIT.

Please note that your online registration is an **EXPRESSION OF INTEREST ONLY** and MUST be approved by your child's school. In order for your child to attend the nominated trial or event this may come down to the discretion of your school as to who is selected to attend the trial. In some sports only 2 students per school can be nominated. Please complete all fields and especially "Representative Experience".

Your child's school will notify you one week prior to the trial date if your child is to attend to the Parramatta Diocesan trial for their selected sport by providing a trial information sheet.

Under no circumstances will a child be eligible to trial if the Online Registration Form has not been completed and approved by the school by the closing date.

\$8.00 trialing fee is payable on the day for after school trials & \$10.00 trialing fee is payable on the day for half day and full day trials.
— This is to be paid upon registration at the trials once your child has been approved to attend the Parramatta Diocesan Trials.

Please note that the full day trials will be for boys cricket, boys soccer, boys rugby league & boys rugby union. Due to the popularity of boys cricket, boys soccer and girls netball a maximum of 2 children only are eligible to trial from each school. Selection of the 2 boys and girls will be made jointly by the school sport coordinator and principal.

Half day trial for tennis and netball... all other trials will be held after school beginning at 4pm.

MACKILLOP TRIAL

It should be noted that the main purpose of the Mackillop trial is to select a team to compete at the NSW PSSA Championships. The Inter-Diocesan MacKillop Trial is not a competition although a round robin format is often used to facilitate the selection procedure.

NSW PSSA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Children who are successful at being selected in the Mackillop team will compete at the N.S.W. P.S.S.A. Championships. These championships involve three or four days of competition at various locations in NSW. Children selected in these teams may also be required to attend training sessions. At the NSW PSSA Championships a State team will be selected to participate at the School Sport Australia Inter State Exchange for some sports.

SCHOOL SPORT AUSTRALIA

To be considered for selction in the NSWPSSA state team for participation at all School Sport Australia 12 Years & Under championships: Students mus be turning between the ages of 10 and 12 in the year of competition i.e. Students turning the ages of 8, 9 and 13 in the year of competition are not eligible for NSWPSSA State selection.

Please note the following information:

- Parents are responsible for all transport and supervision arrangements and must remain to supervise their child at the trial at all times.
- Children need to generally be of representative standard.
- Attendance at training days, where applicable is compulsory.
- The selector's decisions are final.
- Parents will need to make their own travel arrangements for children representing Parramatta at Inter-Diocesan MacKillop trials. This
 may mean travel to Sydney, Wollongong, Canberra, Wagga or Forbes.
- Please be aware that the teacher conducting the trial and accompanying the team to the venue is a "Team Manager" ~ not a coach.
